

# 1. VIKING COMMUNITY FUND

---

**The £2.2million Viking Community Fund launched on the 1<sup>st</sup> of September 2024.** This followed an extensive Shetland-wide community consultation and publication of the first 5-year business plan for use of the fund.

The VCF has two strands – a ‘Strategic Fund’ and a ‘Community Grant Scheme’ which both aim to sustain and develop local communities throughout Shetland.

## Strategic Fund

Applications to the Strategic Fund must also meet one or more of the Strategic priorities,

- More Younger People Wanting to Stay and/or Come Back to Shetland
- Better Transport Links within and Between Communities
- Reduced Cost of Living in Shetland
- Better Broadband and/or Mobile Phone Connections
- Improved Housing Supply and Affordability
- Preservation and Enhancement of Shetland’s Natural Environment

## Community Grant Scheme (CGS)

The CGS carries on the good work of the Advanced Grant Scheme (AGS) which operated during the construction phase of the Viking Energy Windfarm. Funding is allocated to all 18 community councils on the same share basis as was used for the AGS.

1 share areas = £6,515

5 share areas = £32,575

<b>Tier 1</b>	Grants of £50 to £1,000
<b>Tier 2</b>	Grants £1,001 and above
<b>Tier 3</b>	Grants of £200 to £15,000

Tier 1 and Tier 2 decision making lies with the relevant community council. For Tier 3 a funding panel, made up of SCBF directors, allocate funding. Tier 3 is new for the CGS and was created in recognition of the volume of applications to the AGS from Shetland-wide groups and organisations who deliver projects with a wider reach than individual community council areas. SCBF fully administrate the CGS and carry out due diligence, payments and evaluation.

## 2. OVERVIEW OF FUNDING ALLOCATIONS

### Viking Community Fund

The annual fund amount from the Viking Community Fund is £2,215,000 (index-linked).

#### **Strategic priorities annual allocation - £1,637,000\***

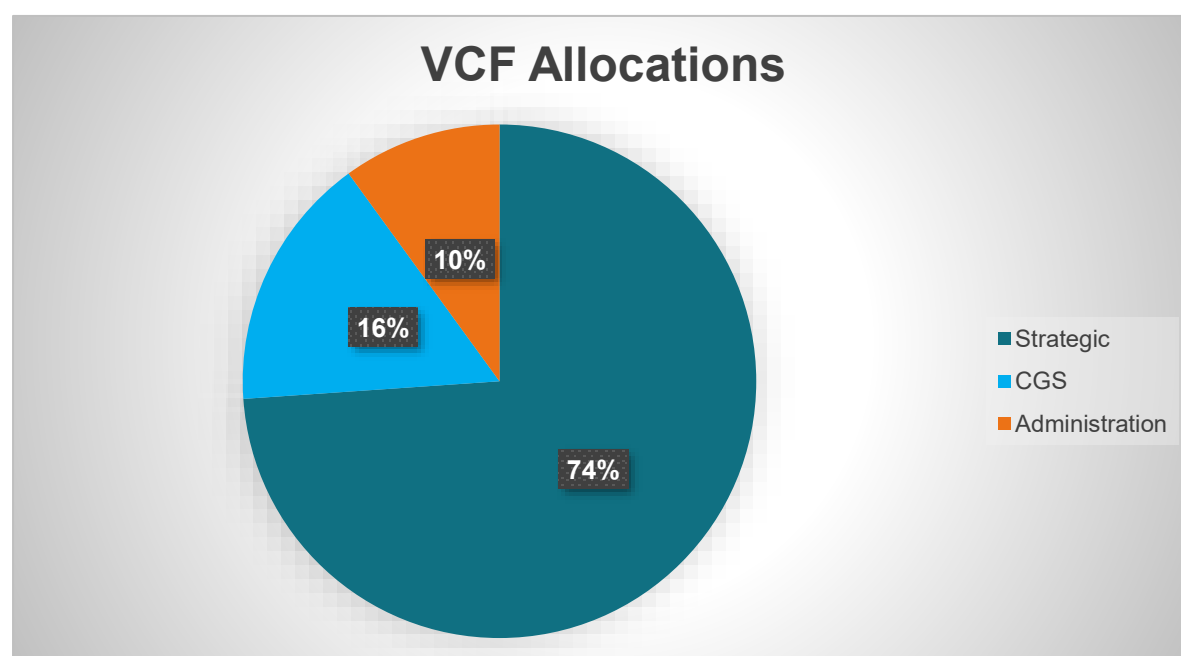
\* This figure was reduced by £200,000 in Year 1 to £1,497,000 to reflect an existing commitment of £200,000 to the MRI Scanner Appeal.

#### **Community Grant Scheme annual allocation - £356,500**

£221,500 is distributed between Shetlands 18 community councils and Tier 3 for Shetland-wide projects has an annual funding allocation of £135,000.

#### **Fund Administration – maximum of £221,500 available**

10% of the main fund is available for administration costs to deliver the fund. Such costs include, staffing, legal and accountancy services and website fees. SCBF spent £112,166 on administration costs in 2024/25.



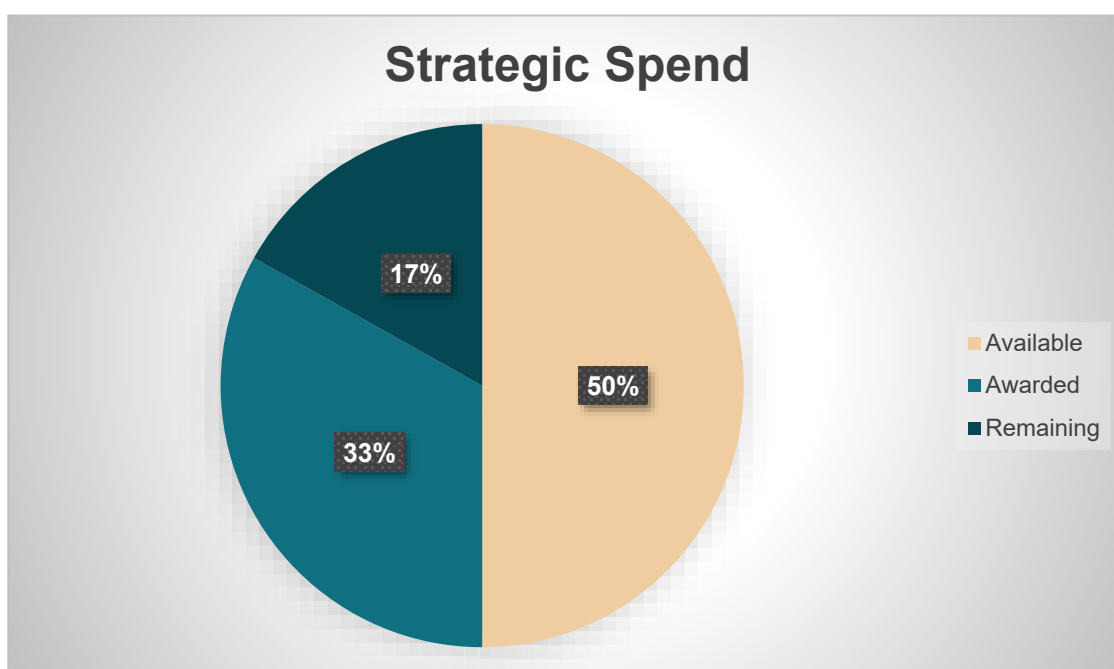
The largest amount of funding, almost three quarters, is focused on the Strategic fund to support the Strategic priorities delivered by the community consultation and adopted by the SCBF Board of Directors.

## 3. STRATEGIC FUND

### VCF Strategic Fund

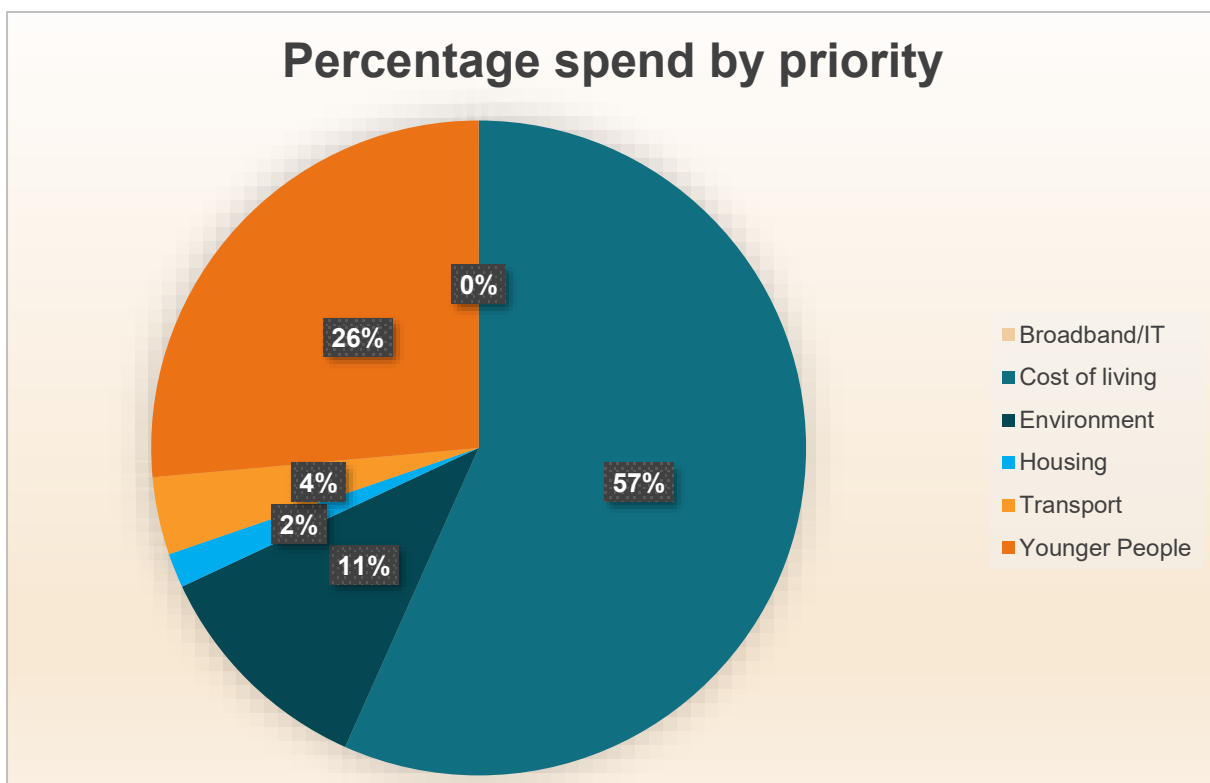
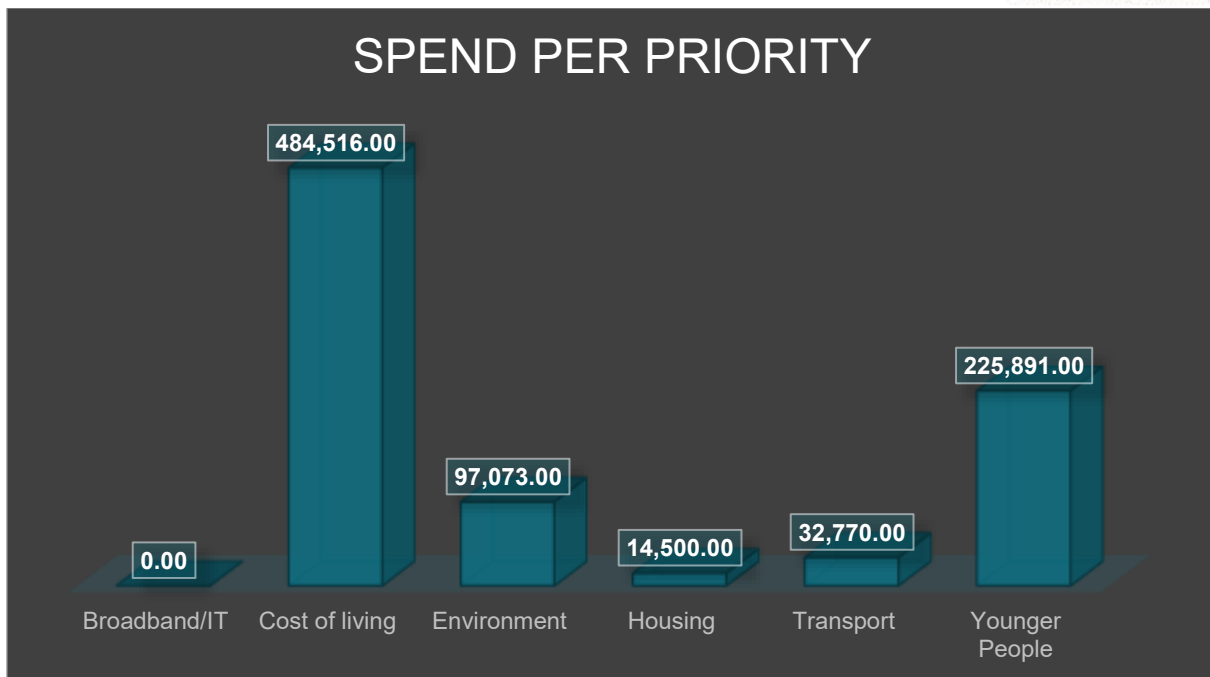
£1,637,000 was available to projects and initiatives which supported the VCF Strategic priorities for funding. £1,084,460 has been awarded up to the 31<sup>st</sup> of August 2025 when the first year of funding ended. This figure includes an earlier drawdown of £200,000 in October 2020 to support the local MRI Scanner Appeal and also £32,710 to support a volunteer development worker post which crosses between the Strategic Priorities and the CGS.

The unspent £552,540 has been carried over and added to the funding available for 2025/26.

Strategic funding supported 12 projects/initiatives, 64 individuals with bursaries and training grants and 11 businesses through the apprenticeship support fund for small businesses. A full list of strategic projects supported by the fund can be found on page 11.

## 4. THE VCF BURSARY FUND

---

SCBF implemented three funding schemes centred around studying, apprenticeships and training to target the priority of 'More Younger People Wanting to Stay and/or Come Back to Shetland'.

### Bursary Fund

The bursary fund opened for the first time in October 2024 for young people up to 25 studying full-time at UHI Shetland or undertaking a local apprenticeship. 71 awards were made in 2024/25 totalling £61,763. Feedback on the scheme was very positive.

## 5. ENERGY EFFICIENCY GRANTS

---

### **Scottish Government Area Based Scheme - £200,000 grant top-up/windows and doors funding - delivered by Shetland Islands Council**

Shetland Islands Council are administering £200,000 in grant top-up funding from the VCF alongside the Scottish Government's Area Based Scheme (ABS). The ABS is awarded to local authorities to develop and deliver energy efficiency programmes in areas with high levels of fuel poverty. It is a blended model of grant funding and owner contribution for energy efficiency measures. The Viking Community Fund is being used to top-up the ABS grant where the homeowner is unable to contribute to the costs themselves. Funding is also available for windows and doors, which are not currently covered as a primary measure, under the ABS. New windows and doors reduce make a great difference to heat loss particularly in exposed areas. 9 properties have benefitted so far with a further 13 approved for funding and awaiting installation.



### **Training Grants - £23,680 - Hjaltland Housing Association and Shetland Renovations Ltd**

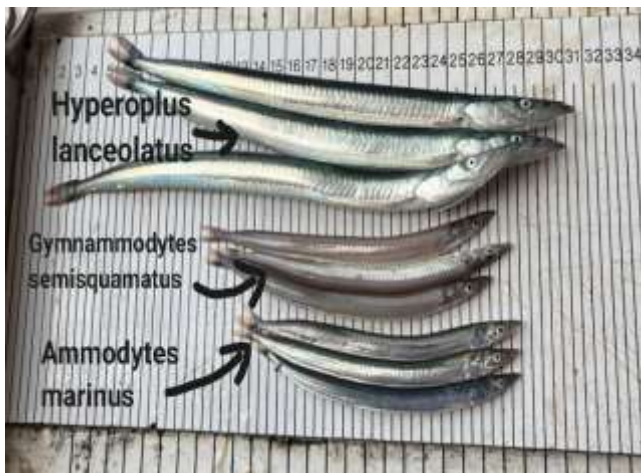
An award of £10,000 to Hjaltland Housing Association finalised the funding required to deliver Air Tester, Retrofit Co-ordinator, Retrofit Assessor and Retrofit Advisor training to up-skill staff in energy efficiency measures. Having this skill within the in-house staff team will assist in planning retrofit measures on existing stock, support future funding bids and ensure the letting of new builds is not delayed through the requirement for air testing.

Shetland Renovations Ltd were awarded £13,680 to train 3 members of staff to NVQ level in 'Room in Roof (RIR) and 'In Wall Insulation (IWI)' retrofit energy efficiency measures. This project aims to improve the supply chain of installers qualified to PAS2030 and tackle the backlog of insulation measures requiring completion in Shetland.

## 6. STRATEGIC PROJECT IN FOCUS – FIRMO

### Fair Isle Research Marine Organisation - £17,273

Supporting the Strategic Priority of the 'Preservation and Enhancement of Shetland's Natural Environment' the Fair Isle Research Marine Organisation was awarded £17,273 in February 2025 towards the costs of carrying out a sand eel survey in the waters around Fair Isle. The fine weather in May allowed for long survey days and the marine scientists from UHI Shetland achieved good survey coverage with 18 valid tows on sandbanks between the east and west of the island.



So far, preliminary results demonstrate clear spatial differences in the catch rates and species compositions that relate to both depth and east vs west, with overall catch rates generally highest on the shallowest areas of each of the banks. Results show three species of sandeel including smooth sandeel *Gymnamodytes semisquamatus*, greater sandeel *Hyperoplus lanceolatus* and Raitt's sandeel *Ammodytes marinus* with the bulk of catches being smooth.

More detailed findings from the survey will be coming soon following formal analysis. This important research will help to gain a better understanding of Fair Isle sandeel populations, how they compare to populations across the rest of Shetland and other areas, and what this might mean for Fair Isle's seabirds.

## 8. COMMUNITY GRANT SCHEME

### Community Councils Spend overview

Community councils began the 2024/25 funding year with varying opening balances due to funding of £316,015 carried forward from the Advanced Grant Scheme (AGS) which ended on the 31<sup>st</sup> of August 2024. Community councils with unspent AGS funds had these added to their CGS allocations for 2024/25. £221,500 was then divided between them on a 1 or 5 share basis.

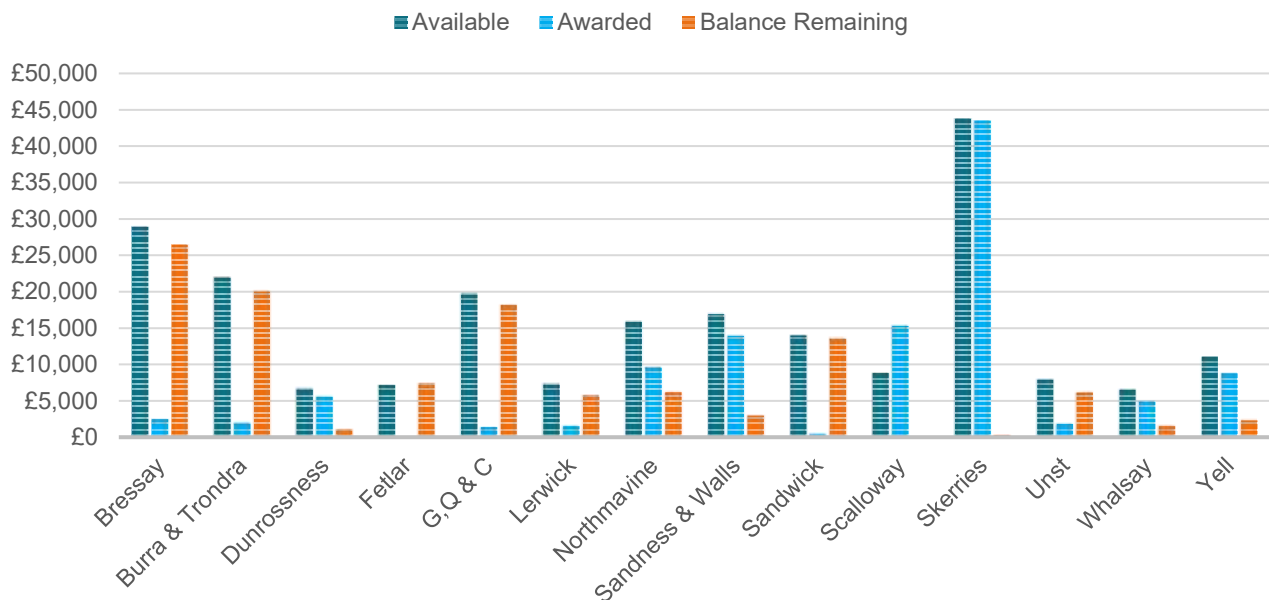

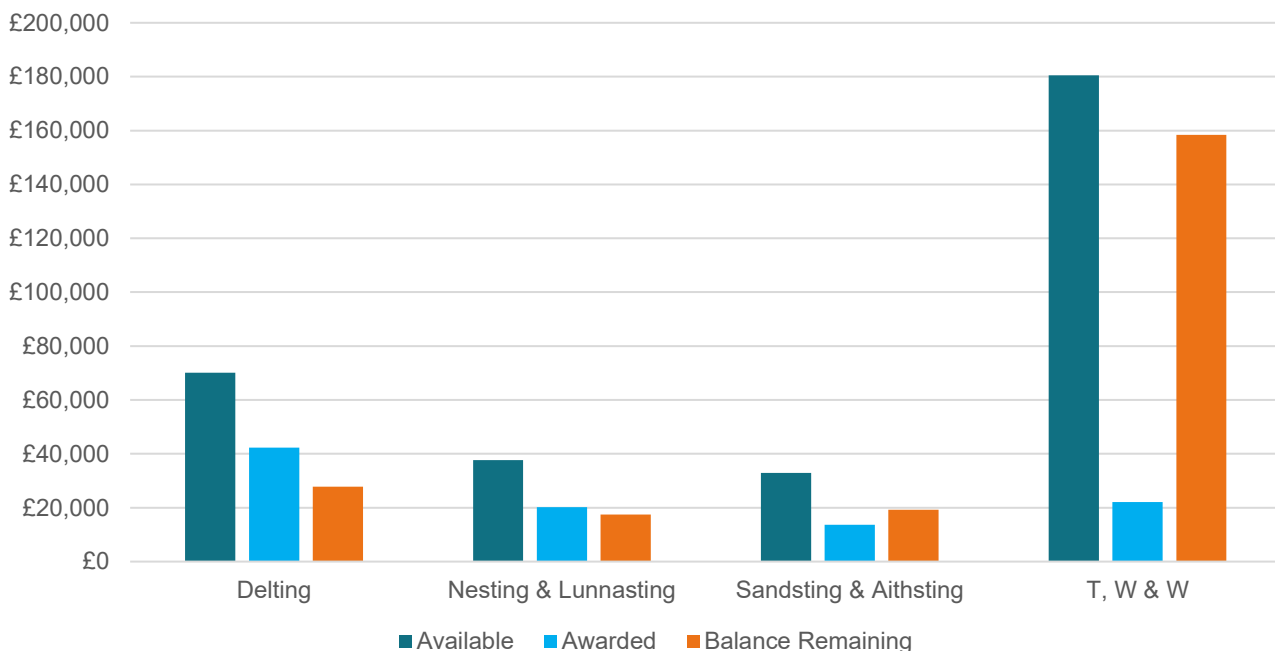

Community councils are permitted to drawdown funding from future years (up to 5) if they want to support projects but have insufficient funds to do so. Any drawdown is reflected in the following years availability of funds. Some communities will also be aware of larger projects due in future and may opt to retain funds for these.

### Tier 1 and Tier 2 Applications

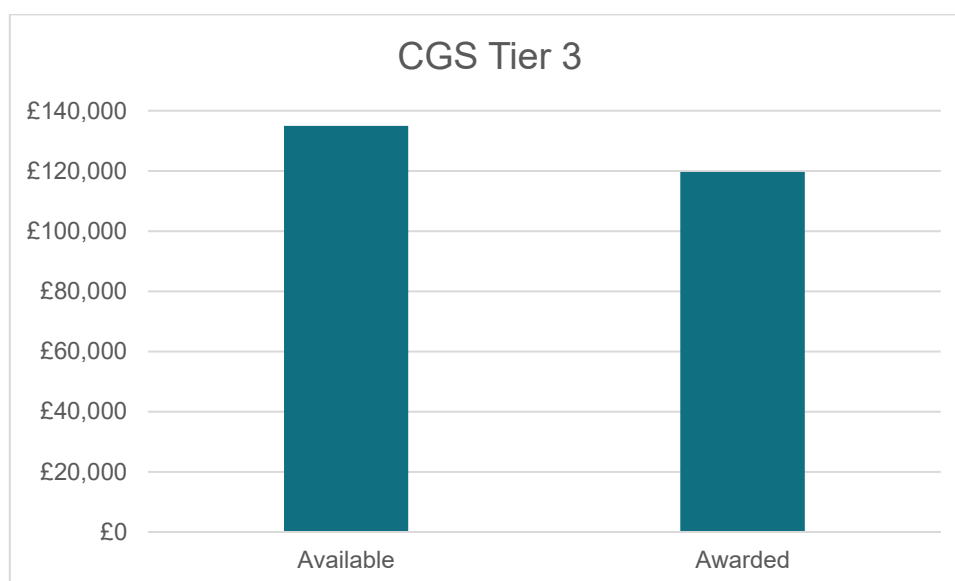
Community councils supported 21 Tier 1 and 21 Tier 2 applications throughout the 2024/25 funding year.

Tier 1 applications between £50 and £1,000 accounted for £17,057 in grant awards with Tier 2 applications over £1,001 being awarded £192,523 between them.

### Tier 3 Community Grant Scheme (CGS)

SCBF introduced Tier 3 to the CGS for organisations delivering projects with a wider reach than individual community council areas. An annual funding pot of £135,000 was made available with 3 application rounds opening throughout the year.

£119,624 was shared between 12 projects. The underspend of £15,376 will be carried into the CGS Tier 3 in 2025/26.



Grants supported 2 multi-year projects, one for an educational drugs delivery programme and the other for a Netball Training co-ordinator. The other 10 projects were one-off events, renovations or 1-year staffing costs. A full list of projects supported by the CGS can be found on pages 18 and 19.

## 9. CGS – PROJECTS IN FOCUS

### Shetland Community Bike Project – New shop flooring - £8,059



A fresh new look for the Shetland Community Bike Project following an award of £8,059 from the Viking Community Fund CGS Tier 3 in November 2024. The existing flooring was 20 years old and in need of a revamp.

The shop serves the whole Shetland community and the new flooring enhances the inside of the shop making it a more pleasant experience for customers, staff and volunteers.

### **The Outpost – Generator - £1,000**



The Outpost received funding in October 2024 towards the purchase of a back-up generator to use during power cuts. Service users and their support workers could often have sessions disrupted due to power outages and the new generator ensures peace of mind and safety for all visitors.

### **Shetland Canoe Club - bringing a trainer to Shetland to deliver Trip Leader/Coach training - £2,000**



Travelling to the mainland to access training can be cost prohibitive for many local organisations who rely upon volunteers for delivery of their clubs/services. Shetland Canoe Club were able to bring a Trip Leader/Coach trainer to Shetland at the end of April 2025. Alongside other funding a grant of £2,000 from the VCF supported the total cost of £3,370. Being able to deliver the training for free to volunteers removed the financial barrier to access the training. 27 people directly benefited from the training sessions with the club now expecting to offer coaching to ~100 different people over a year, with sessions offered multiple times per week.

### **VJ Day Volunteer Group (Unst) – 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of VJ Day Social Event - £833**



A group of volunteers were able to deliver a free social event in the North Unst community hall to celebrate the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VJ Day.

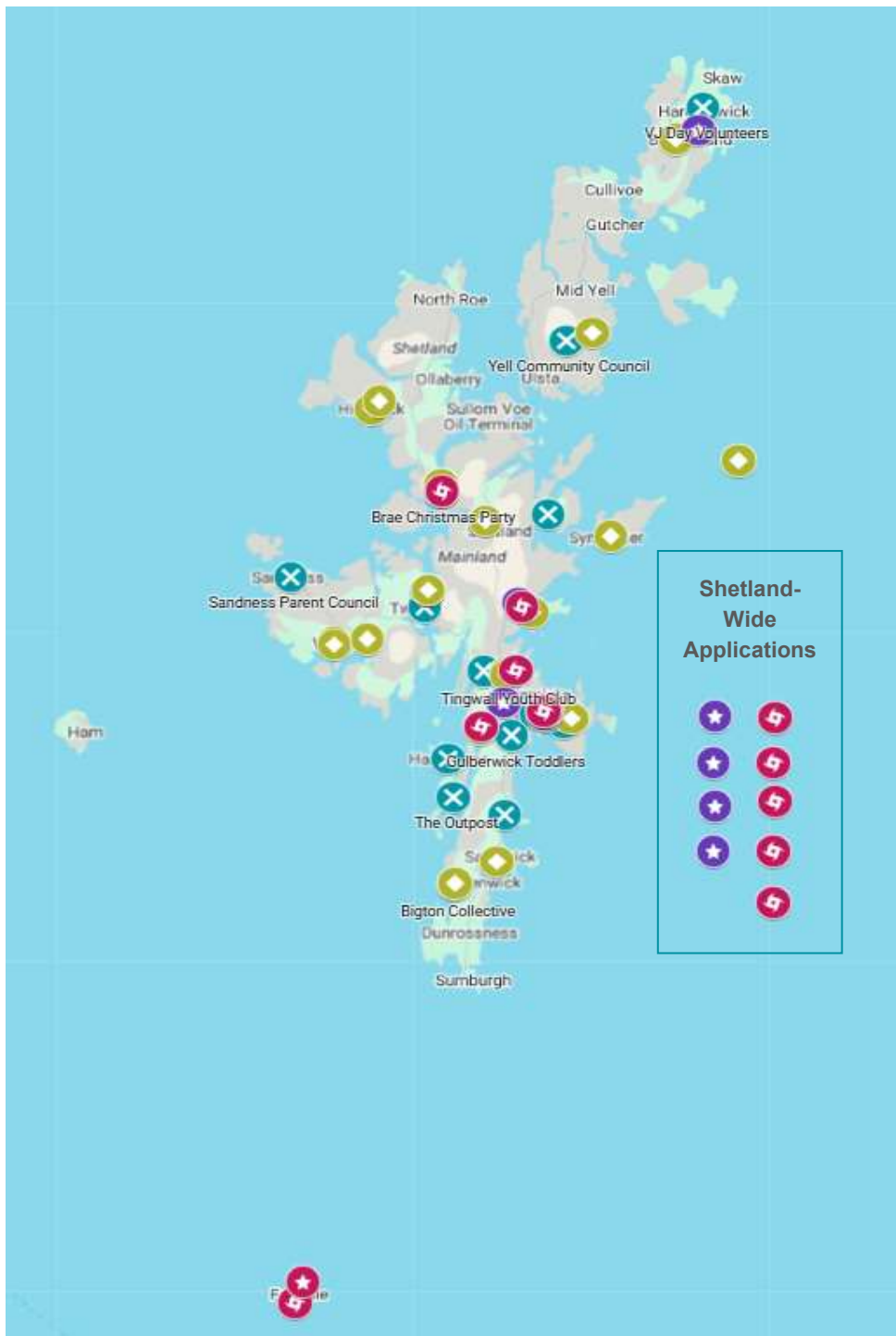
